Full stops

Full stops are used at the end of every sentence – except when there is a question or exclamation mark. This letter has been written without any full stops. When you have added a full stop, underline the word which then needs a capital letter. The numbers in brackets tell you how many full stops are needed in each paragraph.

- **4** It's not as if he was upset or anything besides, it wasn't our fault he was standing there it was just bad luck he was in the way (3)
- **5** I've got this arrangement with Billy he said he'd come round at 6.30 so I'm going to tie this letter to a bit of wood and drop it down to him when I hear a noise at the window Billy said he'd get it to you somehow (3)
- **6** Got to go if Billy is caught it will get me grounded for another month (2) See you soon (I hope!),
